Report From June TAB Meeting

- The Big IEEE Worry: Membership, Membership, Membership
- Personal View: Membership is not the real problem. This "problem" can be fixed by lowering the IEEE fees (Currently \$160)

- A policy for open-access is under study:
 - 120M of the 300M IEEE revenue come from publication.
 - Recommended Action: Promote open-accessfriendly policies.
 - Conduct a series of well defined experiments that allow us to gain some experience while managing risk.
 - John Baillieul is happy to talk to any society interested in conducting an open-access experiment
- New IEEE Policy (from Al Hero): an author that has a paper in the digital library can make the exact same paper available on his/her web page.

Quinquennial Review by IEEE

- Each IEEE Society is reviewed every 5-(6) years.
- The IT Society was reviewed at the February TAB meeting. Fossorier, Neuhoff, Poor, and Rimoldi represented the Society.
- The review was based on a Publications Report and a Society Report, for a total of 75 pages. [Contributions from Fossorier, Goldsmith, McLaughlin, Laneman, Medard, Neuhoff, Poor, Rimoldi, and Tuninetti]

Recommendations From The Review Panel (For info only: Please give inputs to Officers)

- General observation: The Society is well managed and well run. It is financially sound, with a successful conference and a prestigious publication
- In the light of rapid developments in communications technologies and applications, and the growth in the field, the Society may wish to consider revisiting its FOI [field of interest], and bringing it up to date and sharpening its focus.

- The offer of conference proceedings to members is an interesting experiment, and its outcome needs to be monitored, and perhaps reported to SRC in due course.
- The Society may wish to consider establishing an Executive Committee. Such a committee provides the benefits to Society officers in terms of more effective management by being able to meet and take decisions without their BoG meetings.
- The Society should be encouraged to increase the representation of BoG members from Regions outside of 1-6. The present approach of including under-represented areas is a move in the right direction.

- There is active participation by Society members on technical areas, however there are no Technical Committees within the Society. Some consideration should be given to establishing Technical Committees. Such Committees offer a ready platform for members to discuss and develop the technical subject and related activities, and adds to the vibrancy of the field.
- The acceptance rate at its Symposium is quite high 60-70%, this does not compare favorably with the ratio at some ComSoc conferences, e.g. ICC usually has an acceptance ratio of around 40% or less.
- The Society should endeavor to avoid overlaps in terms of dates with ComSoc events, since there is an overlap of members and their interests between the two societies.

- The Society receives a healthy return on its publications nevertheless it needs to ensure further participation from industry in its activities, highlighting the relevance of its publications to the practitioner, perhaps through articles in its Newsletter, or else, through special issues.
- Support for chapters needs to be reinforced and formalized. The Report submitted does not clarify the level of activity of its chapters in any substantial detail.
- The establishment of a Student Committee, and its active participation in the society activities, particularly at its conferences is useful initiative and should be nurtured.

- The Society has a Distinguished Speakers program, and some of tits leaders are international authorities in the field, however the information provided indicates an inclement approach to its Distinguished Speakers activities. The Society should review its Distinguished Speakers Program and consider reinforcing it. The Program could also be a strategic vehicle in reinforcing the Society's ties with its chapters.
- The translation of foreign books could be a rich seam of activity, particularly in subject areas similar to Information Theory, where significant work may have been published in languages other than English. It is recommended that the Society shares its experiences with SRC, and reports on its activities in the area in one year's time,

• Concerning student activities: As stated earlier this is an excellent activity, and should be nurtured. Since the Society is in good financial health, it could consider investing further in the area.
